The Dying SuperDrive

Much like Anna Pavlova in *The Dying Swan*, the SuperDrive in my late 2009 iMac trembled, wobbled and stumbled—although it hasn't yet totally expired. But it no longer works reliably, either, refusing to mount many DVDs that play just fine in other machines. The symptoms slowly worsened over time, and I'm kicking myself for not promptly bringing the iMac in for service before my AppleCare contract expired. Neither a cleaning disk nor any of the many hints and tips I read on line have restored the drive to an acceptable state of

consistent performance. Rather than pony up big bucks for a replacement, I decided to check out the options for an external optical drive.

An obvious candidate was Apple's \$79 USB SuperDrive. However, this handsome aluminum drive is only compatible with Macs that do not have an internal SuperDrive.

Third-party offerings basically fall into two categories: large, fast AC-powered units, and compact, slower, portable USB bus-powered units. I settled on one of the latter: the Samsung SE-218BB/RSBS shown at right (\$38 at Amazon). This plastic tray-loading unit is quiet, has virtually-identical specs

to my iMac's internal SuperDrive, sits neatly atop the iMac's pedestal, and can be easily tossed into a bag for use with my Macbook Air. Be aware that disks inserted into any third-party drive, such as the Samsung, can only be ejected from the Finder: neither the Eject key on a keyboard nor the open-tray button on the drive will have the desired effect. ☀
